# **Elizabeth Holmes: From Innovation to Incarceration**

How did Elizabeth Holmes go from being the world's youngest self-made female billionaire to being sentenced to more than 11 years in federal prison, and how does all of this affect the future of innovation?

Elizabeth Holmes was passionate about chemical engineering and always had big ideas. During a summer break from studying at Stanford, she worked on a computer chip with the Genome Institute of Singapore designed to detect the SARS virus in the body. During that same time period, around 2002, Holmes also patented a device that was attached to a person's body to measure the effectiveness of any given medication. Although these were marvelous ideas, nothing compared to her true passion, Theranos.

At 19 years old, Holmes dropped out of Stanford to fully pursue her career as the founder, and future CEO, of the company Theranos. Originally, this company's big idea was to produce a patch that would easily deliver drugs to the body, but unfortunately, did not end up working. Then, they completely switched the focus of the company. The main goal was to revolutionize health care by developing a way to take a minuscule amount of blood from someone and use that to rapidly and accurately run over 1,000 tests. This idea was soon materialized into a machine called "The Edison". In short, it was an easily portable machine

in the shape of a box that would theoretically take the small vial of blood, and run the necessary tests, all in a short amount of time with no outside labor required. Holmes and her creation completely flooded the world, almost seeming too good to be true. Within no time, Theranos had accumulated more than \$400 million in funds from numerous investors. The investors fully put their faith and money in Holmes and her company, taking a risk that almost paid off. The Edison was even introduced to multiple Walgreens stores where several people were able to make the decision of the types of things they wanted to be tested without permission from their primary physician,

and of course, at a low cost. Everything was going perfectly for Theranos until it all started to go downhill. The problem with The Edison was that it simply did not do what Holmes said it would be able to do. The machine left excess blood everywhere, which was in no way sanitary. It would break down almost every time it was used, causing Theranos' employees to have to risk their safety by putting their hands in the machine, with broken glass and an exposed needle, to try and get it to work. It was advertised as a machine that could run every test with minimal work from Theranos employees, but that was not the case. It would take them a minimum of a couple of hours to prepare every sample to be tested, and most of the time, all of the prep was futile as the machine wouldn't even work. Because the machine would only accurately run a few tests, Holmes secretly turned to tests that already existed and required a lot more blood to be able to work. This meant that it was no longer just a prick on the finger to get blood, something that was supposed to set Theranos apart from every other company. Many people that worked there knew the inaccuracy of The Edison, but either didn't speak up or were simply not listened to. The world desperately wanted to believe that everything about Theranos was real, even when things just didn't line up, and tended to turn a blind eye. Even when Holmes went to get The Edison FDA approved, only one test out of the 240 that was promised was approved. After multiple articles from The Wall Street Journal and The Washington Post were released, Holmes was officially exposed.

Flash forward November 18, 2022, when Elizabeth Holmes was found guilty of one count of conspiracy and three counts of wire fraud. She will be spending over 11 years in federal prison because of the fraud she committed in connection with Theranos. Some may say that this sentence is overkill, but Holmes put several people's lives at stake here. She was testing people for serious illnesses and gave them inaccurate

# The World's First Digital Nation

Our generation has grown up with the reality of mass poverty, displacement, food insecurity, and increasing environmental disasters. And as the effects of climate change become more prominent in everyday life, many are turning to more innovative solutions.

Tuvalu is an independent island nation microstate within the British commonwealth located in the South Pacific ocean. And last year at COP26 (Convention on Climate Change), its Foreign Minister, Simon Kofe, gave a speech about the nation's state of danger due to rising sea levels, droughts, and increasing temperatures to demonstrate the need imminent

while half submerged in the ocean. This year, at COP27, Kofe announced that Tuvalu would become the first digitalized nation– from the metaverse, becoming a part of the digital 3D space.

This action allows them to preserve their nine islands within the metaverse, even as the physical ones disappear into the sea. Accenture Song-owned agency The Monkeys and Collide will make the islands in the metaverse to protect and conserve their presence through cataloging the land, culture, and history.

The nation is predicted to be fully submerged within a hundred years, to which Kofe says, "It has long been the time for action, but we have not stepped up to the challenge" and hauntingly predicts that without action, the rest of the world will soon join Tuvalu.

Although their country's ingrained concept of "fale pili" implores them to look after their neighbors, their own problems were neglected by the rest of the world and they were forced to find solutions in the digital space.

Taking everything into account, remember there is no "Planet B", and in the words of Simon Kofe, it is past time for action, we have now entered a new phase of accepting these realities and understanding the damage we have done and how to live with it. The people of Tuvalu have undertaken this challenge in stride and are finding ways to coexist in this

Unfortunately, Elizabeth Holmes took "fake it 'till you make it' and made it a reality. It has cost her everything.

# Unrest And Tensions Increase in Southeast Asia

A spike in political activity could mark a new era for the region

This year, internal conflict and turmoil in many Asian countries, especially those in Southeast Asia, has led to a growing movement for challenging the status quo that has dominated many of these countries for decades. Most prominently, this has been occurring in Pakistan.

Pakistan, officially the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, is the world's 4th most populous country, a nuclear power, and one of the fastest growing economies in the world. The country has grown rapidly since the 1990s, and the economy is projected to continue to grow exponentially.

Since it gained its independence in 1949, Pakistan has historically been dominated by either powerful political families who control the country's industry or military dictatorships. However, progressive movements in the 2000s led to Pakistan's first democratic transfer of power in 2013, and the election of popular figure Imran Khan after former prime minister Nawaz Sharif was exiled on corruption and money laundering charges in 2017.

An icon of the country and former cricket star, Imran Khan entered politics in the early 2000s, losing a controversial 2013 election but being elected in 2018 by popular vote. Khan would remain prime minister until 2022, growing popular with the general public for combating the exploitation of locals

by large companies, instituting progressive reforms, and reassuring the country's neutrality.

While this did make him popular with the public, it made him the target of many of the upper echelons of the country, leading to a vote of no confidence by the National Assembly that eventually led to a constitutional crisis. Interim Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif was elected, and it looked like the country would return into the cycle. That was until Khan and his supporters led a march to the capital, demanding a re-election.

а mid-October interview, Senator Faisal Khan told Al-Jazeera: "People of Pakistan knew that Imran Khan is not going back to Parliament, yet they voted for him. It shows that they have decided that the country needs fresh election, which is the only way forward." Tensions would rise further with the assassination of independent journalist and investigative reporter Arshad Sharif (not to be confused with the Sharif political family), who fled the country following a warrant for his arrest in August. Arshad continued his work from Dubai, but many have alleged that his stance against the current government was a contributing factor to his murder in Kenya. That only angered the public further, rekindling the flames of protest.

By November 3, the protestors were only a few miles from the capital, but

a lone terrorist opened fire into the crowds and at Khan's caravan, killing one person and injuring 9 others including Khan himself. He took a weeklong break, addressing the public and assuring them he was alright and recovering from 3 bullets in his leg.

On the 10th of November, marches would culminate in the city of Rawalpindi, where he gave a long, emotional speech to tens of thousands of people who gathered to hear him speak. Hobbled on crutches, he denounced the current government and vowed to bring democracy back, but assured people he would do so peacefully and did not intend to incite more violence. He stated, "I have decided against marching on Islamabad because I don't want there to be anarchy in the country. I don't want to cause any harm to this

country." Since then, his party has dominated in an undefeated electoral streak, and seems to be making a comeback.

How does this affect us in the US?

The US has been the guardian of democracy and freedom in the world for decades, and the oppression of over 230 million people who are actively fighting for their freedom is a major issue that needs to be addressed. News about Pakistan isn't as focused on by mainstream media, and headlines are dominated by events such as the War in Ukraine.

It's important to be aware of what's happening around us on a deeper level and remember that the world is large enough that many significant affairs can happen at once. Even in America, there have been attempts to undermine democracy, but we have

luckily managed to resist

What can I do about this?

The best thing to do with events like this (and many other ones that aren't as prominent) is to get the word out and spread the news. If we can encourage people to take another view at the world around them and to do independent research, then that is the first step to standing up for what is right, no matter where it may be. You can also stay updated on global news rather than just the headlines, which will allow you to have a broader understanding of events.

# What are the dangers of this new government?

The recent seizing of control by the Taliban in Afghanistan, with which Pakistan shares a border, could pose a large threat to the country. The weaker, more decentralized government could be prone to pro-Taliban

officials being elected, which would cause the country to regress and likely once again spark terrorist activity that previous governments have worked so hard to counter.

Plus, Pakistan's nuclear arsenal stands at threat of being seized and used as leverage in a possible revolution or coup, so a peaceful resolution is important as not to spill any more blood.

Also, the economic recession in the country could lead to unhealthy reliance on loans from their neighbor in China, who has created debt traps for other struggling

countries and turned them into puppet states.

# Where does the country go from here?

It's impossible to tell what will happen next, but it's likely that Imran Khan will be given power in some shape or form to please the people. The immense public support he has poses a threat to the current institution, and makes it hard to quell calls for democracy and change. However, it could go either way, and it's even possible that another military coup of the country will occur to bring it back under control, restoring order at the cost of freedoms and constitutional rights for the everyday person.

# Two Ex-NFL, De La Salle Legends Return to Aid Spartan Football

Titans of De La Salle Football, Maurice Jones-Drew and Terron Ward, the two have become synonymous with De La Salle's long standing football legacy and have acclaimed much respect on and off the football field.

possess carving out distinguishing De La Salle's football legacy than that of two De La Salle Alumni, Maurice Iones-Drew '03 and Terron Ward '11. They have contributed to the Spartans' unmatched high school legacy, etching their names into football record books at De La UCLA, Oregon State University, and the National Football League. Their tight bond is so strong that they refer to themselves as "Brothers". Living just down the street from one another in Antioch, Jones-Drew became best friends with older brother, TJ Ward. TJ Ward also played in the NFL for Cleveland Browns the Denver Broncos,

distinguishing him as a notable alumnus from the DLS Class of 2005.

After De La Salle, Maurice Jones-Drew and Terron Ward continued their football journey college. In 2003, Jones-Drew accepted a Football Scholarship to UCLA, where he recorded an average of 28.5 yards per punt return in his first year, an NCAA record. As a college athlete, he broke several records and ran a collective 4,688 yards over his career with the Bruins, a current record at UCLA in all-purpose yardage.

At UCLA, Jones-Drew recognized that De La Salle had already prepared him for the competitive environment of Pac-12 football. "Because I had played at such a high level

in High School, fending off guys from taking my job or doing everything I [could] to help us win. That when I got to college that stuff was easy, the stuff they were asking of [me] I've already done times ten."

In 2006, the Jacksonville Jaguars drafted Maurice Jones-Drew in the second round, as receiver and running back.

After graduating from De La Salle in 2011, Terron Ward headed to Oregon State University, where he recorded 1,843 career rushing yards (12th highest in OSU history) and 22 rushing touchdowns (8th highest in OSU history). In 2015, as an undrafted rookie free agent, the Atlanta Falcons picked up Terron Ward as running back

Today, Jones-Drew and Ward enjoy the serenity of retired life, looking back fondly on their successful careers in the NFL and their time at De La Salle. This recent nostalgia prompted Jones-Drew and Ward's return to the De La Salle football field as coaches for the 2022 football season.

Jones-Drew and Ward

serve as what they call "allround Coaches", critiquing sharing feedback to all parts of the team, based upon their football knowledge and experience. As running back coaches, this expertise made a significant impact on elevating the skills of Spartan running backs, Charles Senior Greer (committed to Fresno State University), Sophomore

Derrick Blanche, Sophomore Dominic Kelly. Under their tutelage, the Spartan running backs drove a collective 3,233 rushing yards for 521 carries and 45 touchdown runs in the 2022 football season.

Coaching at De La Salle reminded Jones-Drew and Ward of the meaning and importance of being a Spartan. Ward says, "De

La Salle means maturing, brotherhood. learning how to be a man, to be reliable, accountable, and to be your own person. It instill[s] the characteristics to be successful, to be a better man."

This Spartan lesson of accountability, echoed both Jones-Drew and Ward, carried them throughout their NFL career. "When you get to

the NFL you learn to work by yourself. De La Salle teaches you accountability and how to push yourself." Jones-Drew concluded, "the love that I have for this school and for the people in this school, the kids that go to this school, the guys that I went to school with and grew up with, it just means a whole lot."



#### Q3: Who has stood out on your team so far?


I would say that so far, Lucas Phister has stood out the most. He has been a very good leader and defender.
