Our Lasallian Commitment to Financial Aid

When Saint John Baptist de La Salle founded the Christian Brothers' schools in 17th-century France, he set out to create a Christian educational system devoted to providing an accessible and comprehensive education, with a focused commitment to the children of the poor. Today this mission is carried out by more than 100,000 Lasallian educators in educational institutions throughout the world.

At De La Salle High School, one of the ways we accomplish our Lasallian mission to serve the poor is through an intentional commitment to our extensive financial aid program. For the 2022-23 school year, over \$4.4 million was awarded to families with varying levels of financial need, with aid going to 37 percent of our students.

All Lasallian schools in the District of San Francisco New Orleans are responding to a mandate that at least five percent of our student bodies be from families whose income does not exceed 185 percent of the federal poverty level--the income level that would qualify a student for the Federal Reduced Lunch Program. At De La Salle, we use 300 percent of the federal poverty level due to the Bay Area cost of living. In 2022, this would mean a family of four making \$83,250 or less.

To serve such families, De La Salle High School established the Bishop John S. Cummins Scholarship Program. This program is a tribute to the Bishop Emeritus of Oakland who is an affliated member of the Christian Brothers and is a tireless champion of Catholic education, especially for the poor and marginalized.

Access

The Bishop Cummins Program targets high potential students from families who have expressed a strong desire to attend De La Salle but have very limited financial resources.

Financial Support

The Bishop Cummins Program addresses the inequities in our society that often prevent low-income students from fully participating and excelling in high school. De La Salle is committed to providing the financial resources necessary to all those who qualify for admission through this program. In addition to the possibility of near full tuition assistance, additional financial support is available to ensure that students and their families can engage in all of the curricular and cocurricular opportunities De La Salle has to offer.

Tools to Succeed

De La Salle is committed to making a difference in each student's life by providing a learning environment that emphasizes Christian values and academic excellence. With a committed faculty, challenging academic program, comprehensive co-curricular offerings, and a dedicated Bishop Cummins Student Support Coordinator, Bishop Cummins Scholars are provided the opportunity and tools to succeed at De La Salle High School and beyond.

Growing Need

For the 2022-23 school year, there are 68 students who are Bishop Cummins Scholars. The budgeted cost of the Bishop Cummins Program totals \$1,515678. Of this, \$1,319,760 is reserved for tuition assistance for these qualified students, \$67,600 covers additional expenses incurred throughout the year by individual students, and \$128,318 goes to operational expenses.

By working with our generous community of donors and benefactors, we hope to ensure proportionate accessibility for a diverse student body by growing funds for our Bishop John S. Cummins Scholarship Program. While the Bishop Cummins Program is reserved for families living at the poverty level, our fundraising efforts for this program also increase our ability to answer the growing need for financial aid from families in the increasingly squeezed middle class. Every dollar that we raise for the Bishop Cummins Program will free up other dollars that can be made available to families with lesser levels of need.

Population Served

The median household income in Contra Costa County is \$103,997, but the families we serve through the Bishop Cummins Program don't make that amount. The Bishop Cummins Program specifically targets students of these deserving families who reside within Contra Costa County including Concord (specifically the Monument Corridor and North Concord), Pittsburg, Bay Point, Antioch, and areas west of the Caldecott Tunnel including Oakland and Richmond.
